

As many of you are aware, the decision to support the lifting of the deed restrictions got a favorable recommendation from the Planning Board and Land Use. It had already had the support from DelDot to lift the deed restriction that ran in favor of the state. Right now I am awaiting Capano's decision as to when he wants to come to County Council to see if he can get the votes to lift the deed restrictions. I will let the community know as soon as they give me the date. (Update received 11/12/2006: Capano is scheduled to be at council on the 28th of this month.)

Just keeping you updated as to what is happening in our area. Please contact me anytime with your questions and concerns.



Maintenance News

The following are the major highlights of last month's maintenance meet-

- The fire damaged home at 207 Holly Cove has been released by the State Fire Marshall. New Castle County Offices will support the homeowner and our community in the development and rebuilding process.
- Phase III of the open space has been turned over to our maintenance association. This space includes the playground and wet retention pond.
- The board decided to change snow removal contractors for this season. Creekside Landscaping has been awarded the snow removal contract for this year.
- Driveway parking has improved since our last notice. Keeping parked cars off the street and in the driveway improves conditions for emergency vehicles and your neighbor. Also to avoid damage to your vehicle please keep roadway clear during snow removal.
- We have made improvements to the open space at the gazebo area. New plantings, walkway, tree trimming, landscaping at waters edge and gazebo seating installed.
- A new water service has been installed at the entrance area. We are currently obtaining estimates for a limited water sprinkler system. This will allow our seasonal plantings at the entrance and islands to be watered.
- Under NCC's Amnesty program the county has promised to complete the necessary repairs and maintenance to our dry retention pond. The county will provide the labor and heavy equipment and

Timber Farms will pay for the material which is estimated at \$1500.00 This has been a pending issue with the county for seven months. New Castle County has promised to complete the work by the end of November.

- The following is information regarding the payment of maintenance dues by residents:
- 0.5% lost to bankruptcy
- 1.4% owe more than one year's dues
- 2.8% owe 2006 dues
- 95.3% fully paid
