Letter From The President

We've been fortunate to have terrific weather for much of the year. Summer passes by so quickly - I hope all of you have had a chance to spend time outdoors enjoying it. Remember to close your garage door and lock your doors in the evening. We've recently had a few burglars who took advantage of the easy access afforded by open garage doors after dark. I'd also like to remind you about several simple things that you can do to keep your home safe and secure:

Locate your main water supply shutoff - Every teenager and adult in your home should know how to locate and operate the main water supply valve to isolate any unexpected or sudden leaks. Practice operating the valve when no water is being used by the washing machine or dishwasher.

Locate your electric panel and main breaker - Every teenager and adult in your home should also know where the electric circuit breaker panel is located, and they should be able to locate and operate the main supply breaker to shut off electricity to the entire house in the event of any suspected electrical problem.

Learn the procedure for a suspected natural gas leak - If you smell natural gas in or around your home, report this emergency immediately to Delmarva Power at (302) 454-0317. Also see www.delmarva.com for other useful information related to electricity and natural gas in your home.

Have your chimney inspected and cleaned - Your chimney should be inspected and cleaned regularly. Contact a local chimney service company to arrange for an inspection, and follow their recommendations, especially if you use your fireplace frequently during winter months.

Call Miss Utility before you dig in your yard - If you plan to dig in your yard, you are required to contact Miss Utility (www.missutility.net, or dial 811) at least two days in advance so that the locations of your utility services can be clearly marked. See the web site for more information.

Contact your local utility company if you have any questions regarding safety in your home.

NOTES FROM THE NEIGHBORHOOD

When a Chicken Crossed the Road

Result: a Blue Hen on Kirkwood Highway

Robert Kirkwood, Sr. arrived at the port of New Castle as a three year old child in 1731. He was born in Donegal, Ireland in 1728. After his father, William Kirkwood died, his mother, Sarah, immigrated to New Castle along with Robert's older sister.

Little Robert lived with his father's brother in Mill Creek, where his uncle was born and was a member of White Clay Creek Presbyterian Church. Robert later married Jane Henderson of Christiana Presbyterian Church.

Together they had nine children, eight girls and one son. Their son, Robert II, was born in 1756 on a farm on Polly Drummond hill, an area that adjoined the White Clay Creek Presbyterian Church.

At age 20 (1776), Robert II was commissioned a Lieutenant in the 1st Delaware Regiment with the Continental Army. He was promoted to Captain in December of 1776. In 1783 Kirkwood was appointed Major and returned to Newark, DE. In recognition of his service during the Revolution, Delaware gave Kirkwood 100 pounds (Delaware was using British currency at the time.)

In 1788 the state of Virginia gave Kirkwood 1,920 acres of land in Belmont County which was in the North West territory. The North West territory had a confederation of the Shawnee, Delaware, Ottawa, Iroquois, Chippewa, Miami, and Pottawatomi tribes. Major battles ensued. Apparently, the British encouraged the Indians who inhabited the area to fight the new settlers following the end of the Revolutionary war.

In March of 1791, Robert Kirkwood was commissioned a Captain in the 2nd Regiment of U.S. Infantry (one company of which was raised in Delaware.) Their direction was an effort to secure the North West territory with a line of forts. The effort failed and on November 4th, 1791, Kirkwood was shot and scalped on a battlefield near Fort Recovery, Ohio near the Indiana border. He was 35 and in his 33rd battle.

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THE OFFICER'S CORNER



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Captain Robert Kirkwood was with the regiment from the first battle of the Revolutionary War on Long Island, NY, in August 1776. He saw it through to its last battle in the South, Eutaw Springs, S.C. in Sept 1781. Captain Kirkwood participated in a total of 32 battles without injury – including that with George Washington in the pursuit of Cornwallis until his surrender. Following the Battle of Camden in South

Carolina, in 1780, Kirkwood's troops won fame and were later nicknamed the Blue Hen's, a popular gamecock being bred by Jonathan Caldwell of Kent County. The University of Delaware would later choose the Blue Hen as their mascot to honor Captain Kirkwood and it became the state bird in 1939.

Captain Robert Kirkwood married Sarah England, from Chester County. Their only son, Joseph Kirkwood was raised in Delaware and married Margaret Emily Gillespie. She was a descendant of Rev. George Gillespie, the first pastor of White Clay Creek, and head of Christiana churches near Newark, DE. Joseph and Margaret moved to Belmont, Ohio in 1806 where they had eight daughters and a son. Today, the name Kirkwood is a very distinguished name in that area of Ohio.

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MAINTENANCE NEWS

The Maintenance Board reminds all residents once again to have fences, sheds, pools, additions etc. approved before the start of construction. Recently, the Maintenance board had to take to the Court of Chancery a resident who had started construction of a shed before submitting plans to the Maintenance Association. It could have been averted if the homeowner took the proper procedure. The action taken was expensive and time consuming for both parties.

New Castle County has inspected both of our retention ponds and submitted their findings to us. The necessary corrections were made on both ponds to bring them into compliance.

Some of our residents are in arrears with their maintenance dues. New Castle County has billed each resident and payment was due on the due date. If you suspect that your dues are not up to date, please contact the Maintenance Association.

Our security patrol is active on a random weekly schedule. The security patrols have had a positive outcome on our development. Included in their reports are: suspicious cars stopped, people loitering in the posted park areas after dark are asked for identification and identifying cars that park on the street overnight.

There will be a notified Maintenance Association meeting this October. During this meeting there will be the election of officers.
